

7 Ways to Start New Spiritually

Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!

2 Corinthians 5:17

1. Start With Identity, Not Improvement

You don't begin new by trying harder, you begin by remembering who you are.

- You're not fixing an old version; you're living from a new one.
- New life flows from new identity, not self-effort.

2. Release What No Longer Belongs to You

New beginnings require letting go of old attachments.

- Old habits, old labels, old guilt, old seasons.
- You can't carry yesterday into tomorrow and expect something new.

3. Stop Rehearsing the Past

What you constantly replay, you empower.
